Perspectives from Vanessa Cowling, Nicole Clare Fraser, Olivié Keck, and Thanduxolo Nombali Phakathi.



Vanessa lecture's part time in the Photography department at UCT where she recently completed her MFA, earning a distinction. She was awarded the 2023 Tierney fellowship, and won the Paris based, international "Blurring the Lines" competition for her Masters work. Her research has a strong emphasis on sustainable photographic practices and the environment, questioning the role of photography in a changing landscape.



Nicole Clare Fraser (b. 1989) is an image maker and artist based in Cape Town. Her making is photographic in practice, looking at built structures, interior spaces and objects suggestive of human presence, absence, loneliness and impressions of tenderness.

Nicole holds an MFA (2022) and BAFA (2012) from the Michaelis School of Fine Art, Cape Town. Alongside her personal practice, Nicole lectures in photography, with a particular focus on darkroom techniques and printing. She has taught photography at various secondary and tertiary institutions in Cape Town. Furthering her skill in the medium, she has completed darkroom photography and hand printing workshops with the highly regarded and master black and white printer, Dennis Da Silva, in Johannesburg.

Olivié Keck was born in Cape Town, South Africa in 1989, where she is currently based. She received her BFA from The Michaelis School of Fine Art, University of Cape Town in 2011. Her tertiary education includes completing a printmaking internship with Warren Editions Print Studio in 2015 and David Krut Studios in 2016. Since her first solo show *False Priest* in 2014, exhibited at Commune 1, Keck's work has been shown in many galleries and institutions locally and internationally. Her work is featured extensively in the permanent collections of the Spier Arts Trust and The University of Cape Town. In 2020, she was invited to produce a work for CNN International for a feature focus on contemporary artists creating work in self-isolation.

"The colourful and patterned aesthetic of my work commemorates the theatre of human experience, whilst echoing my fascination with contemporary culture as explored through the lens of visual storytelling. My work extracts meaning by remixing a long history of artistic traditions with contemporary signifiers. There are a variety of different artistic mediums and methodologies present in my work, which speaks to my visual curiosity as an image-maker. I believe that embracing and utilizing the interdisciplinary possibilities of different materials, and innovative technologies allows artists to adapt and create meaningful contributions in a rapidly changing cultural environment."








