Liberty Du, who is widely recognized as Faith XLVII, is a South African known as one of the world's most prominent female street artists. Her journey into art began on the streets of South Africa in 1997, as a young graffiti writer taking on the name Faith47. Since 2006, she has developed a multidisciplinary artistic practice. Monumental and intimate, private and public, her artwork takes the form of murals, video installations, sculptures, tapestries, drawings...

Deconstructing notions of value and place, investigating forms of domination, she explores the shapes of human perception.

In quest of the divine, she expresses a longing for a deeper connection to the wisdoms of the natural world.





Keya Tama is a South African artist based in the United States, between Los Angeles and New York. Inspired by pastel colour palettes, pattern, and symbolism, Keya Tama has been a practicing artist and muralist since the age of thirteen. His style can be describe as ancient contemporary minimalism; by processing and refining images into minimalistic forms while maintaining their essence, his works aim to reunite old and new through contrasting yet unified iconography. Working primarily in acrylics to create his pieces, there is a strong graphic feel to each piece. Across the artist's practice, there are recurring themes of contrasting ancient and contemporary iconography, family and community, monomyths, and minimalism.

Danger Gevaar Ingozi Studio



Bevan de Wet (b.1985) is an artist and printmaker based in Johannesburg. He graduated with a BFA with distinction from Rhodes University in 2008. From 2011-2016, de Wet worked at the Artist Proof Studio in Johannesburg as a professional print technician, collaborator, and academic facilitator. In 2016 he founded his own print studio called Eleven Editions, where he also collaborates with other artists and publishes various projects. De Wet regularly works with Phumani Archive Mill, a paper-making research unit at the University of Johannesburg, where he produces his handmade paper work.


His practice centres around our increased sense of alienation from the natural environment and the spaces we inhabit, drawing attention to the fragmented nature of our current engagement with the world.



Nabeeha Mohamed

Nabeeha Mohamed (b.1988) is a South African artist based in Cape Town. She completed her fine arts degree at Michaelis School of Fine Art at the University of Cape Town. Her very personal work grapples with the contradictions of identity and class privilege in post-Apartheid South Africa. Her position as a woman of colour, hushed during her childhood years in an attempt to assimilate to the white society and culture she grew up in, is now celebrated in her paintings where colour and strangeness take centre stage. These celebrations of identity are intersected with a playful critique of the capitalist economy and class privilege from which she benefits. Mohamed has participated in group exhibitions locally and internationally.

David Krut Projects

Born in Johannesburg, David Krut is an international print publisher, book publisher and the founder of David Krut Projects. With a focus on developing art careers and education in South Africa, David Krut Projects is an international arts organization, operating in Johannesburg, Cape Town and New York. In 2000, Krut began inviting New York-based master printers to Johannesburg to collaborate with local artists, which led to the establishment of David Krut Workshop, a dedicated intaglio print workshop in Johannesburg in 2002. The David Krut Workshop (DKW) specialises in the techniques of intaglio, relief, monotype printing and silkscreen. There is a skilled team of printers whose focus is, from conception, for each collaboration to become an opportunity for the artist to create something new. Over the last 20 years DKW has collaborated with local and international artists.





He completed a post-graduate diploma in painting at the Michaelis School of Fine Art, University of Cape Town, in 2010 and in 2011, received the Tollman Award for Visual Arts and the Absa l'Atelier prize. He spent six months in residence at the Cité Internationale des Arts in Paris, and works produced during this residency were exhibited at the Absa Art Gallery in Johannesburg in 2013. Grose held his first solo exhibition with Stevenson in Cape Town in 2013. He has participated in group shows including Space and Place at EIGEN + ART in Leipzig, Germany (2021).
