
THE SHELF SHOW A group exhibition curated by the atelier and Balekane Legoabe, featuring works by Cathy Abraham, Dale Lawrence, Fanie Buys, Hedwig Barry, Neil Badenhorst, Pule Ratsoma Sam Kentridge, Chloe Reid and Balekane Legoabe

Cathy Abraham (b.1968) is a South African artist based in Cape Town. Abraham completed her MFA, with distinction, at the University of Cape Town's Michaelis School of Fine Art in 2018. She works systematically to unlock surface meaning in the search for a deeper understanding of the purpose of the everyday. Abraham constantly questions the boundaries between reality, fantasy and illusion in comparison with existence and death. She uses materials in quirky playful ways. Her practice is grounded in the belief in links between art and science; spiritual practice and reincarnation; and the search for ways of shifting perspectives. Her work challenges notions of time and space; as well as expectation versus reality - collapsing past, present and future.




Scandalous Interview: 22.08.04 (X) Monotype 21 x 29.7 cm



FANIE BUYS


Fanie Buys (b.1993) in Gansbaai, is a South African artist. After being shuffled through a fair range of the Garden Route socio-economic spectrum he attended the Michaelis School of Fine Art, graduating with a distinction in studio work in 2016. Buys was a co-recipient of the Judy Steinberg Award for Painting and the Simon Gerson Award for an exceptional body of work. Buys has been included in several group shows and has mounted two solo shows to date, *This Man* in 2018 and *Happy Birthday Jesus!* in 2019 (both at 99 Loop Gallery in Cape Town).

Hedwig Barry (b.1986) is a South African artist working at the intersection of the visual arts, arts education and research. Her drawings, paintings and sculptures are grounded in a rich conceptual terrain that articulates a femenist politic of love and desire in artistic practice and society at large. Barry's work explores the grounds we walk on and live in. She asks how we teach and learn, how and whom we include, and what we make along the way. In 2020 Barry graduated cum laude from the MA Fine Arts programme at the Wits school of Arts in Johannesburg.






Home is where the heart is (my own hallowed ground) oil on linen $20 \times 15 \text{ cm}$

NEIL BADENHORST

Neil Badenhorst (b.1995) is an illustrator and multidiscplinary artist based in Johannesburg, South Africa. Badenhorst completed his Undergraduate and Honours degrees in Visual Communication (majoring in Illustration) at the Open Window Institute in 2017 and 2018 respectively. Badenhorst completed his Masters Degree in Design (Illustration) in 2021 at the University of Johannesburg. He intends to work towards his PhD in 2023, exploring 'ambient narrative' as a means for queer ritual process. His practice extends into painting, collage, digital media and more recently installation art. In terms of theme, his work explores liminality, queer experience, worldbuilding and narrative. His creative process relies heavily on intuition, and his work attempts to map out the eternally expanding internal landscape and visions of the fantastic in order to better comprehend 'real' experiences and surroundings.



Sam Kentridge (b.1992) is a Johannesburg based artist who is obsessed with words - some of his current favourites being "and", "although", and "pebble." He is interested in the seductive phrase, the liberatory phrase, the quietly defiant phrase. Working with text and images discovered in second hand book stores, Kentridge is fascinated by the authoratative tone in out-of-date pedagogical texts, and the creative possibilities to be found in subverting this tone by cutting and reshaping that pedagogy into poetry - searching for the messy emotional core hidden just beneath the surface of what pretends to be dry, objective prose. Themes include loneliness, hope, middle class ennui, and the pain of biting the inside of your cheek so that it becomes slightly swollen, and then you bite same spot only moments later and now your ham and cheese sandwich tastes of blood.



CHLOE REID




